Pastor's Notes

This is nothing in the Presbyterian tradition that prevents you from sharing in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper with us at home. As the Pastor and the Clerk of the Session serve each other communion, you should feel free to join us in sharing this sacred meal. There are many possibilities to use for the elements: a bread of any sort is suitable, including crackers, tortillas, etc.; and any sort of fruit juice would be appropriate, as would wine or even water. It is our hope that in sharing the sacrament in this extraordinary way we may be mindful of our common faith and the life we share with the Body of Christ.

Remember also, in the Presbyterian tradition we believe that God hosts a table open to all who seek to be followers of Jesus Christ. The table is wide enough, ample enough, and open enough to serve all of God's creation.
