P.P. 231-232 - in the New Testament

Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. Pastor's Notes

The painting on the cover of our Bulletin is entitled "The Angelus" and was painted by the French artist, Jean François Millet (1814-1875). Three times a day (9:00 a.m., noon, and 6:00 p.m.), a devout Catholic is called to pray the Angelus, which is often announced by the ringing of church bells (as can be seen in the background of Millet's painting).

Too often, modern Christians bring an idealized notion to the important spiritual practice of prayer. "Sweet Hour of Prayer," our congregational hymn-- attributed to William W. Walford (1772-1850), reputedly an obscure and blind lay preacher in Colshill, England-- is a musical example of this romanticized concept. Peaceful and contemplative prayer is to be devoutly cherished, of course, but the absence of peace and a shortage of time are never valid excuses to avoid a conversation with God.

As Paul admonishes us, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances ..." (1 Thess. 5:16-18). We can do this as easily in hectic times as we can in peaceful times. Praying is good for our soul and is "the will of God in Christ Jesus" for each of us (1 Thess. 5:18).
