Second Scripture Reading: Matthew 15:1-20

P. P 16-17 in the New Testament

Then Pharisees and scribes came to Jesus from Jerusalem and said, "Why do your disciples break the tradition of the elders? For they do not wash their hands before they eat." He answered them, "And why do you break the commandment of God for the sake of your tradition? For God said, 'Honor your father and your mother,' and, 'Whoever speaks evil of father or mother must surely die.' But you say that whoever tells father or mother, Whatever support you might have had from me is given to God,' then that person need not honor the father. So, for the sake of your tradition, you make void the word of God. You hypocrites! Isaiah prophesied rightly about you when he said:

This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."

Then he called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."

Pastor's Notes

The art on our Bulletin cover is entitled "Christ among the Pharisees" and was painted c. 1660 by the Flemish master, Jacob Jordaens (1593-1678). The original was purchased at an auction conducted by Sotheby's Hong Kong in 2019 and remains in a private collection.

In Jesus' era, the Pharisees were the most influential Jewish religious leaders of their day. One of the principal tenets of their orthodoxy was that, in addition to the written law contained in the Torah, God also passed on a rich and detailed "oral tradition" to Moses and the Hebrews. Strict adherence to the many picayune details of this tradition was necessary in order to achieve ritual purity (and thus righteousness) sufficient to escape God's condemnation.

It would be supreme error, however, to confuse "the Pharisees" with "the Jews." Just as Luther was careful to distinguish the behavior of corrupt clerics from the doctrine of the true Church, we should be careful to separate the behavior of one ancient sect of Judaism from the Jewish faith.

Jesus condemned the hypocrisy of the Pharisees, but he walked and taught lovingly among the Jews of Palestine. In his famous "seven woes," Jesus ferociously condemned the "scribes and Pharisees" (Matthew 23:13-36, note especially v. 33, "You snakes, you brood of vipers! How can you escape being sentenced to hell?"). He was condemning their behavior which, by the practice of their traditions, was antithetical to the word of God. Jesus' words are a cautionary tale to us today. We must not let our slavish adherence to tradition impede our efforts to walk faithfully in the light of the Good News brought to us by Jesus.
